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VET DETECTIVE:

SMALL FRACTURES, BIG CONSEQUENCES

Performing dental procedures is one of the most common things we do for the cats that we see at Shropshire Cat Rescue, and the cases in this article show how important it is to treat dental disease.

Have you ever had toothache? Was it sore?

A frequent comment that we hear during our consultations is 'but my cat is eating so their teeth can't be sore'. Our pets are no different to us- they tolerate toothache, and continue to eat as this is their survival instinct, but they are still in pain! Cats are notorious for hiding signs of illness and discomfort; it is often not easy to look at their teeth and therefore a lot of dental disease can go un-noticed.

Two cats came to us this year-Blue and Coco, who both had fractures of their canine teeth



(the big 'fangs' at the front of their mouths). Blue, the handsome chap pictured, had a problem with the tooth in his mandible (the lower jaw) and Coco had a fracture of his maxillary canine tooth (in the upper jaw). Both these cases were good examples of how a seemingly insignificant chip from the tip of a tooth can have severe consequences.

The pulp cavity is the soft tissue forming the inner structure of a tooth, and contains nerves and blood vessels. This is surrounded by dentin; hard dense bony tissue forming the bulk of a tooth, and covering this is a layer of protective enamel- humans have relatively thick enamel but in our pets it is very thin; between 0.1 and 1mm. In cats, the pulp cavity is very close to the tip of the tooth, meaning that the smallest chip off the tip of the tooth can expose the pulp cavity, allowing infection to enter. Even a fracture of a few millimetres can result in pulp cavity exposure. commonly resulting in death of the tooth. Left untreated, this causes chronic pain.


This can be seen nicely in the radiographs of Coco. The red arrow points to the normal pulp cavity in



the normal tooth (this is an older cat- the pulp cavity narrows with age) and the green arrow points to the dentin of the tooth (this gets thicker with age). The blue arrow shows a wider pulp cavity- this tells us that the normal development of the tooth has stopped or slowed, and it also tells us that this fracture happened a while ago. On the side view, the yellow arrow points to the tip of the tooth and if you look closely you can see the pulp cavity communicates with the outsidethere is no protective enamel. This has led to the very end of the root



of the tooth- the apex, to start having an abnormal appearance (purple arrow). When we extracted the tooth, you can see that the dental probe goes right into the sensitive part of the tooth- Ouch!



This tooth had a chip of just 2mm off the end of it- small fracture, big consequences.

If you have any concerns about the dental health of your cat, do get it checked out by your vet.

CRESSAGE FERALS

On the 19th of April we received a message from Next Steps Rescue, informing us of a colony of cats in Cressage in desperate need of relocating. They were living at a property on a main road and their feeder had moved out and left them behind.

Being hungry, they were travelling across the main road and were being killed. Most were unneutered, some were obviously sick and there were kittens. It was a pretty desperate situation.

We went to assess the situation, and managed to trap 4 there and then. There were others that we hated to leave behind, but simply did not have the space to take them with us. Thankfully, Next Steps were also trapping and together we have managed to trap all but one and move to safety. At the time of writing, there is just one Tom left which is playing hard ball!

We have taken in 12:

- 3 were pregnant, 2 early stages and 1 full term
- 1 was too injured and had to be PTS
- 4 have been relocated to outdoor homes
- 4 are waiting to find farm/ outdoor homes

Nearly all of the cats were covered in ticks and had heavy worm burdens. They had all been well fed up until the feeder moved, but sadly help had not been sought for neutering or treatment of these animals.

Pictured are Chilli, Kimchi and Nacho being weighed. They all received flea and worm treatment on arrival, but we needed to know a weight for accurate treatment. Ferals are not very good at stepping on scales for us!

Also pictured is Wasabi, who was full term pregnancy. Over the course of 3 days, she gave birth to 3 kittens but only 1 has survived. She is doing an excellent job as a mother, and is such a sweet little girl. A real diamond in the rough. It's times like this that show how important it is for rescue groups to



work together for the health and safety of cats.

If you are concerned about a colony, please contact a rescue. Most rescues are able to provide help through Trap, Neuter, Release or arrange relocation if the area is not safe.

from Belgium that planned a trip to the UK so they could see the amazing work we do.


